The sudden collapse of the Novi Sad railway station canopy on 1st November 2024, tragically claiming 16 lives and severely injuring another, exposed potential institutional negligence and opaque procurement during its recent reconstruction. This devastating event ignited widespread mass protests across Serbia, initially in Novi Sad, fueled by deep-seated dissatisfaction with government corruption and media censorship.

This tragedy marked a pivotal moment for Serbia, galvanising citizens, particularly students, in their demand for justice, transparency, accountability, the rule of law and democratic reforms, even calling for snap elections.

Nearly eight months later, their unwavering determination to see change persists.

In recognition of this powerful push for democracy and to assess the tangible impact of these citizen demonstrations on Serbia's political landscape, the Foundation for European Progressive Studies and the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung Serbia Office are organising a public conference. This event will bring together Serbian and European actors to discuss the evolving situation in this crucial Western Balkan nation.
