The <u>Progressive Migration Group</u> (PMG) is a network of African and European migration experts established by the Foundation for European Progressive Studies in collaboration with the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung. Fondazione Socialismo Ets joins the group's efforts for the 2025 Rome and Brussels (December) consultations.

The PMG examines the relations and cooperation between the European Union and African countries or regions of origin and transit, aiming to put into question the prevailing emotionally charged narratives surrounding migration. Its primary focus is to develop practical recommendations and policy proposals for progressive forces at EU, African and national levels, addressing both migration and other policy areas that impact migration drivers and movements.

In the year when the European Union and the Africa Unions celebrate the 25th anniversary of their relation and ahead of the 7th EU-AU Summit on 24-25 November 2025, this PMG Rome consultation will explore topics such as the European Union's overemphasis on irregular migration and externalisation. Additionally, we will discuss return cooperation, as well as the potentials for fair Africa-EU labour agreements that move beyond conditionality or the Italian "Immigration Flow Decree" to create a win-win situation for all parties involved, such as safeguarding migrants' human rights, security and dignity and catering to AU and EU's interests.









The conference aims to foster equitable dialogue, and mutually beneficial migration partnerships that support regional integration, and reflect the aspirations of people across the Mediterranean.
