



WHAT DO EUROPEAN CITIZENS WANT FROM EU FOREIGN POLICY?

Ahead of the new European Commission taking over, the Foundation for European Progressive Studies (FEPS) and the European Council on Foreign Relations (ECFR) are delighted to invite you to an internal seminar to discuss and share some insights as to what citizens want the EU's role in the world to be. With the EU election results now known, the pertinent questions are: how is the new composition of the European Parliament going to impact the EU's political system, especially in terms of the balance of powers? What sort of political initiatives should be brought about so that the European Union delivers to the expectations of its citizens in terms of foreign policy?

In a dangerous, competitive world, citizens made clear at the recent European elections that they want the EU to 'come of age' as a geopolitical actor. This has also been reflected in the FEPS Millennial Dialogue survey. Over 56% of Millennials believe that the EU should have more powers to represent Europe with a single voice on the world stage. A recent ECFR representative polling of 60,000 individuals in Europe in turn shows that most believe that they are living in a EU that can no longer rely on the US security guarantee and feel vulnerable to Russian interference in domestic politics.

From the EU's relations with Russia, the US and China, to sanctions, migration flows trade and climate change – what can European Progressives learn from the recent elections? How can they deliver on the mandate for change – including in the sphere of foreign policy – that EU citizens gave them?

With Josep Borrell likely to take over as High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and building on Federica Morgherini's important legacy, Progressives have a clear opportunity to advance a strategic agenda for the EU's role in the world aligned with what European citizens want.
